• The SLPD hosted its Annual Legal Update training, which was provided by our new Legal Counsel, Advisors, and Trainers, Attorneys Eric Edwards & Bill Amato. The firm currently serves as legal counsel to 20+ municipal and collegiate police departments in Arizona and the Arizona Association of Chiefs of Police. In addition to legal advice and training, Edwards & Amato review and provide feedback on policy preparation.

- Reimbursement requests for OPSG were submitted up to 12/13/2024.

- SLPD continues to make purchases using the funds from our Border Security Grant funds.
- SLPD was awarded \$956,478 from the Department of Public Safety Local Border Support Grant and is scheduled for City Council review/approval on March 12, 2025.
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- In partnership with the Gadsden Elementary School District (GESD) #32, two School Resources
 Officers will be assigned to San Luis Middle School and Southwest Junior High School, through a
 School Safety Grant Fund awarded to GESD 32 in the amount of \$269,703.68. The item is
 scheduled for review/approval during the March 26, 2025, City Council meeting.
